SERVIZI ITALIA: One new contract awarded in Lazio at the San Camillo - Forlanini hospital in Rome.

The contract is worth around € 22.5 million over a 5-year period.

Servizi Italia was also awarded the 6-year contract to operate the main sterilisation system within the Authority.

Servizi Italia S.p.A., a company listed on the STAR division of the Electronic Stock Market (MTA) of Borsa Italiana, in its role as group leader in a Temporary Association of Companies, was awarded a new contract in Lazio, at the San Camillo – Forlanini Hospital in Rome, to provide both laundry and linen services and general supply of operating theatre sterile clothing.

For Servizi Italia the contract is worth around € 22.5 million for the entire 5-year duration, with the possibility to revise prices in accordance with ISTAT index.

Specifically, Servizi Italia will provide the Authority with laundry and rental services for linen mattresses, as well as sets of bed linens and sterile accessories necessary for surgery, disposable articles, and ancillary materials, including the management of storage facilities and transport, pick-up and distribution services.

For sterilisation services, in its role as group leader in a Temporary Association of Companies, the Company was also awarded the contract by the San Camillo – Forlanini Hospital in Rome for outsourcing operations of the sterilisation service within the hospital, which provides disinfecting, washing and sterilization of surgical instruments and linens to meet the needs of the health care clients of the contract awarding company.

By winning this six-year contract, renewable for another six years, Servizi Italia will be able to use a new production site to provide its sterilization services. Pursuant to a thorough renovation and upgrade of the buildings and the technological, testing and inspection infrastructure in compliance with prevailing legislation, Servizi Italia will be able to meet the needs of the San Camillo – Forlanini Hospital in Rome in addition to the needs of other hospitals in the region.

“With these new contracts,” remarked Luciano Facchini, CEO of Servizi Italia, “we have attained another important objective in the Lazio Region, by reinforcing the long-standing professional partnership with the San Camillo – Forlanini Hospital in Rome. Furthermore, the lengthy contract will allow us to continue to optimise production management and consequently improve profitability of the Ariccia laundry facility while at the same time, it will give us another upgraded production site that meets the needs of the largest health care facilities in Lazio, which are very interested in the quality of the sterilisation services and strict compliance with current legislation.”

“This sort of customer approval,” continued Facchini, “in which Servizi Italia is viewed as a trustworthy professional partner to assign “core” services, brings us great satisfaction because it



demonstrates that we as a company have continued to fulfil our social responsibility of guaranteeing jobs and creating others.”
